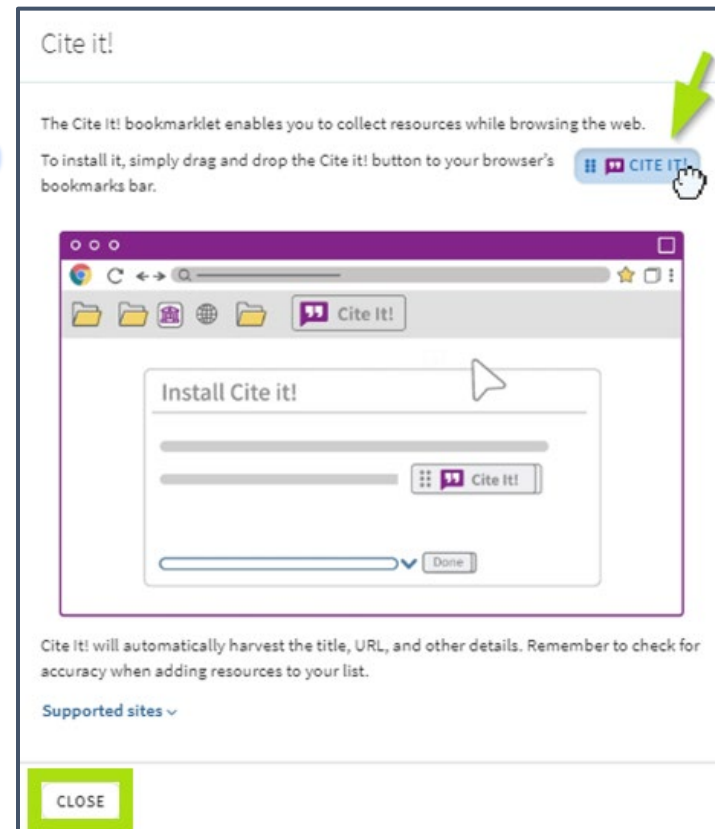
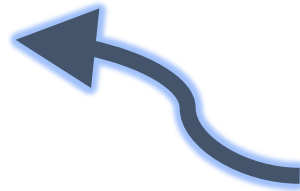
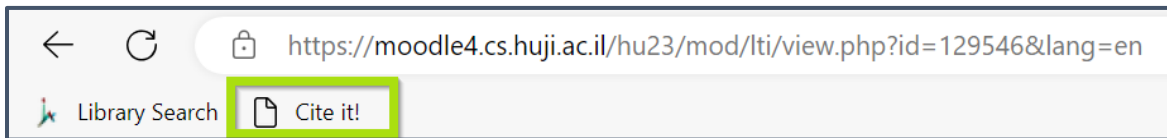

Click on the "**User Menu**" in the reading list and choose “**Cite It!**” from the menu
